A non-profit organization designed to assist the low and moderate-income individuals/families in Eaton County with housing needs. The goal of HSEC is to improve the quantity and quality of decent, safe, and affordable housing and to reduce the number of homeless individuals and families in Eaton County.

Hours: 8:30 am – 5:00 pm; M – F

Walk-ins for information are welcome, but appointments are necessary for other services.

Services:

Homeless Assistance Program – Case management and assistance with locating affordable housing and referrals to other agencies and support services. Possible financial assistance with a portion of first months rent may be provided with all efforts aimed at securing safe and affordable housing.

Homeless Prevention Program - Case management for individuals and families facing court ordered evictions, foreclosures, including back taxes, with referrals to additional agencies and support services. All efforts aimed at preventing an eviction or foreclosure by providing financial payments as necessary and available.

Mainstream Section 8 Voucher Program - A monthly rental subsidy program for adults with a verifiable disability including case management/coordination.

Down Payment Assistance Program (IDA) - Case management and assistance for mortgage down payment assistance. Minimum 6-month commitment to save \$20.00+ per month is required. Includes 3 to 1 matching funds for the down payment or closing costs.

Supportive Housing Program (REACH) - A rental subsidy program designed to assist mentally ill homeless individuals with housing stability including case management/coordination.

Housing & Employment Guides – A listing of known available rental units and jobs in the Eaton County area, updated every Tuesday.

MSHDA HomeLINKS Educational Services – Pre-Homeownership classes, group and individual financial resource management, credit repair, foreclosure prevention, predatory lending, and home maintenance.

Landlord/Tenant Issues - Information and advocacy to aid resolution of landlord/tenant issues.

Extended Services Program – Previously homeless cases who have secured housing receive 6 months of follow-up services to promote housing stability.

Prisoner Re-entry Program (MPRI) – Special transitional housing for parolees who qualify for MPRI – must be placed by the parole office.

Requirements: All applicants must provide the following documents:

Driver’s license or ID card

Social Security Numbers for **ALL** household members.

Verification of housing emergency – eviction notice, court judgment, foreclosure notice, or back tax foreclosure notice.

Verification of income –check stubs for past 30 days, statement of SSI or DHS payments, child support, etc.

Current household bills – electric, heat, water, sewer, phone, and garbage removal.

Receipts for any other expenses – credit cards, car payments, medical bills and educational costs, etc.

Any Department of Human Services (DHS) paperwork, including SER decision notification.

Eligibility: Some restrictions/requirements

Fees: \$20 for credit report (IDA only),
No fee for all other programs.

Services: Available to Ingham, Eaton, Clinton, Gratiot, and Shiawassee county residents facing emergencies. Motel vouchers may be provided for families and individuals with a verifiable illness/disability, not able to access public shelter. For clients without verifiable illness/disability, a recent legal eviction notice is required and motel vouchers are only provided to families with children. The intake procedure includes efforts to place clients in public shelters before the option for a motel is considered. Program provides food bags once every two months per client, personal needs (deodorant, soap, shampoo, razors, feminine hygiene products, toothbrushes, and toothpaste), baby formula and diapers. ID is required for self and family.

Disaster Relief: Provides motels, food, clothing, medicine, cleaning supplies, etc. to the victims of fire, flood, and other disasters. Also provides referrals to other agencies.

Military Assistance: Twenty-four hour communication and assistance provided for military families and active duty personnel. Some limitations on all programs.

State Emergency Relief (SER)

Must be homeless (living with friends does **not** qualify) or court ordered eviction.
Housing must be affordable, maximum obligation cannot exceed 75% of net income.
IE: Family of 3 on DHS receives \$477.00, no add'l income. \$477 x 75% = \$357
Client Caused (required payments must be made for past 6 months or meet "Good Cause")
Maximum issue must solve emergency and prevent emergency from arising again.
Must pursue potential resources. If applicant does not meet all required above, SER is denied.

DHS Emergency Services:**

Pays for eviction prevention, first month's rent and deposit, may assist with utility shutoffs, home repairs, relocation, burial, and miscellaneous emergency needs.
Housing must be affordable. Housing obligation cannot exceed 75% of net income.
Client must have adequate income in the future to cover on going housing/shelter needs.
Must first have a SER denial.

**Ingham County's ES funds distributed to community agencies, primarily CACS, for eligibility determination

All applicants referred to Housing Services for Eaton County first for needs assessment and case mgmt.

Vendored payments available for persons receiving cash grants if vendor payment will completely cover total amount owed. If client chooses to have the payment vendored, and provider agrees and supplies necessary information, DHS will send the housing payment directly to the person who provides shelter. The shelter payment is deducted from monthly FIP grant and paid directly to provider. Heat/electric vendoring also available. The client may request termination of vendor payments at any time. Client is required to sign Vendor Payment Request (DHS-560).

Services:

Homebuyer Purchase/Rehab Loan (HPR-Loan): This is a loan program using Federal HOME funds to assist low-income individuals and families purchase and complete moderate rehabilitation on an existing single-family residence. New homes are not eligible for assistance under this program. Certain conditions apply to be approved for these programs. There are two components under to HPR-Loan Program – Down Payment Assistance and Home Rehab Assistance. The Down Payment Assistance (DPA) component provides assistance for a down payment and closing costs. The amount available for this component is up to \$10,000. A program provided by MSHDA determines the amount of DPA that each file is provided. The Homebuyer Rehab (Rehab) component is additional money provided to the homebuyer to complete moderate rehabilitation after the residence is purchased to make the house more energy efficient, remove health and safety hazards, or to replace or repair defective items in the house. The amount available for this component is up to \$20,000. Additions or remodeling are not eligible under this component. The home must remain vacant until all rehab work is completed.

HPR-Loan Eligibility: Income limitations are based on HOUSEHOLD SIZE

Housing Rehabilitation & Emergency Repair Program: Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds from the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) for housing rehabilitation. Interest free loans up to \$25,000 are available to Eaton County homeowners for home rehabilitation repairs. Loans are also available to make emergency repairs that are causing health or safety hazards in the home. Homeowners are usually required to match between 25% - 75% of the project cost depending on household income and size.

Program requirements are:

1. your home must be a single family residence used as your primary residence
2. your home loan & property taxes must be current
3. you must have homeowners insurance
4. you must complete all required forms
5. you must provide all required information in a timely manner.

Eligible repairs or replacement include: basement, foundation or structural repair, roof repair or replacement, electrical and plumbing repair, furnace repair or replacement, well and septic system repair or replacement, bathroom and kitchen cabinet replacement, insulation, painting, wall and ceiling repair, floor covering replacement, and energy efficiency improvements including new doors, windows and siding. A licensed, insured contractor must complete all repairs.

Eligibility: income limitations apply, you must income qualify.

Foster Youth Mentors: provides mentors for high-risk children to help them remain in a community setting while serving as role models. The mentors can help assist parents, relatives, or foster parents in their efforts to establish routine and structure.

Family Counseling Center: offers affordable individual/family/marriage counseling, provided by professionally trained staff. Coping with depression, anxiety, and grief; parent-child relationships and communication; and self-fulfillment/actualization are just a few of the issues that can be addressed in a safe and supportive environment.

Transitional Housing for Homeless Mothers (also known as Ballentine Stepping Stones): provides transitional housing that leads the way from homelessness to independent living. Programs designed to improve self-esteem and encourage economic self-sufficiency help break the cycle of poverty and abuse. With 16 furnished apartments for mothers age 18 and older and their children, this experience within a transitional setting helps foster a positive family relationship conducive to the personal growth and stability of mother and child.

Children's Home: serves youth ages 10-16 that need long-term placement (approximately 1 year). An on-grounds educational program is provided as needed for children unable to attend public school. Individual, group, and family therapy are provided.

Crisis Residential/Respite: offers stabilization and assessment services to youth in crisis ages 15-17 years old. Individual/group/family therapy is provided. Focus on family stabilization so youth may return home. Stays vary 1-90 days.

Foster Grandparent: a community based volunteer program that connects low-income seniors with exceptional and special needs children in a consistent one-on-one relationship. The senior volunteers aged 60 and over, spend 20 hours per week with their assigned children in local schools, educational programs, and after school facilities. As part of the National Senior Service Corps, the volunteers receive a small non-taxable stipend.

Senior Companion: offers a service opportunity for low-income senior citizens to provide companionship to adults with special needs. Senior volunteers serve developmentally disabled adults, aged 45 and older, as well as chronically mentally ill and physically frail older adults.

Housing Support for Homeless Families: Provides housing support for two years, helping families move from homelessness to independent living. Designed to improve self esteem and encourage economic self-sufficiency, and break cycle of poverty.

In Home Respite: volunteers assist family caregivers of homebound, chronically ill or handicapped adults and frail elderly. Coming to the home for a few hours each week, volunteers give caregivers a much-needed break from their demanding routine.

Refugee's Resettlement: the resettlement component of Refugee Services is the receiving program in Mid-Michigan, through which refugees are resettled in the community. Refugee Services assist in arranging housing, healthcare, and community orientation for refugees.
