Notes from Fr. Anthony

This weekend we celebrate the great feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. On this day we commemorate in a particular and public way the actual, physical presence of Christ among us. That is a point I try to drive home anytime I talk to someone about the Eucharist – it is the only place on this earth where Christ is physically present. He is present spiritually in the other sacraments, in the scriptures and in the world. The presence of Christ is stronger in the other sacraments than it is in the natural world, as all the sacraments lead to and flow from the Eucharist. The Council of Trent (1545-1563) also reminds us that: "The most Holy Eucharist has indeed this in common with the other sacraments, that it is a symbol of a sacred thing and a visible form of an invisible grace; but there is found in it this excellent and peculiar characteristic, that the other sacraments then first have the power of sanctifying when one uses them, while in the Eucharist there is the Author Himself of sanctity before it is used."


I don't think we realize the magnitude of the Holy Eucharist, which would be why so many neglect attending Mass or do not go to confession often enough or at all. If we truly grasped the words of Christ "this is My body... this is My **blood**" - how much more respect and awe would we have for the Blessed Sacrament. At this point we should remind ourselves of the meaning of **transubstantiation**, and we can find a good definition in the Council of Trent: "Because Christ our Redeemer said that it was truly his body that he was offering under the species of bread, it has always been the conviction of the Church of God, and this holy Council now declares again, that by the consecration of the bread and wine there takes place a change of the whole substance of the bread into the substance of the body of Christ our Lord and of the whole substance of the wine into the substance of his blood. This change the holy Catholic Church has fittingly and properly called transubstantiation."

There is a grave misunderstanding among Catholics as to the difference in the belief in the Eucharist between us and other denominations, it is a certain form of relativism. To put it simply, the Catholic Church has always and will always teach that the Eucharist is the actual physical presence of Christ. After the words of consecration are pronounced transubstantiation takes place and that which was only bread and wine is now the body and blood of Christ under the appearances of bread and wine. He is there until every single host is consumed, that He is present in the Eucharist which is not consumed immediately as well, which is why we have tabernacles and Eucharistic adoration. Other denominations believe that it is only a spiritual presence or that it is just a sign of Christ, or that He is present only at the moment of communion - not before and not after. This would be the reason why churches of other denominations do not have tabernacles. Christ is not physically present in their communion so there is no need to have a place to reserve and safeguard it. This is the reason why Catholics cannot receive communion in the services of other denominations

and why those of other denominations are not allowed to receive communion in the Catholic Church. Whenever one receives communion, one answers with an "Amen", which means that one believes what that church teaches on the Eucharist. The particular belief in the Eucharist and in transubstantiation is what primarily identifies one as Catholic or as not Catholic. If one did not believe that the Eucharist is the actual, true body, blood soul and divinity of Christ, then how could one rightly be considered a Catholic as this is one of the most central and core teachings of the Church. Let us take a look at the dogma of the Eucharist from the Council of Trent: "the holy council teaches and openly and plainly professes that after the consecration of bread and wine, our Lord Jesus Christ, true God and true man, is truly, really and substantially contained in the august sacrament of the Holy Eucharist under the appearance of those sensible <u>things.</u>" It is one of the central dogmas of the Faith, and as such demands our intellectual and spiritual obedience. It is not open to discussion in regards to the truth of it. One might have questions or even occasionally doubts, however, at the end of it all, the will must bow to the Faith. If the Eucharist is not really the true presence of Christ, then all the other sacraments lose the majority of their efficacy and become symbols for the most part. The Holy Mass ceases to be the sacrifice of Calvary and becomes some sort of memorial performance, holy orders ceases to become necessary as it exists primarily for the confection of the Eucharist, confession becomes nothing more than a therapy session of sorts, baptism and confirmation allow me only partly into God's family as I cannot achieve the level physical closeness to Him on this earth and anointing of the sick and last rites become unnecessary in turn.

To close, let us thank the Good God for offering us such love, that He desires to be with us in a physical way. He desires to be that close and intimate with us, His creations. John 6, 47-51: Amen, amen, I say to you, whoever believes has eternal life. I am the bread of life. Your ancestors ate the manna in the desert, but they died; this is the bread that comes down from heaven so that one may eat it and not die. I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world.
