

Notes from Fr. Anthony



Taking a small break from our heresy, I wanted to jot down a few things before I go on my yearly canonical retreat. Firstly, I will be gone during the week, so there unfortunately will be no Mass during the week. I will be back for the weekend, so no changes there. Every year a priest is required to go on a 5-day retreat, this is stipulated by canon law, which is why it is often called a "canonical retreat". I go on retreats that are specifically geared towards priests and the spirituality of the priesthood. These are silent retreat - which means the only talking is done by the retreat directors, the two priests who preach the conferences and so on. The religious order that does these retreats for the priests also does retreats for the laity, taking into account the specific vocational spirituality of each group ad the times that work best for retreats, for priests it is during the week, for the most of you it is the weekend. The group is called Opus Angelorum (work of the holy Angels) and their website is opusangelorum.org. I recommend their retreats to all, they have family retreats as well, so they offer something for everyone and not only are the good and Catholic, but they are also the foremost authorities on the Holy Angels, so that is something they include in every talk or conference. If you haven't been on a retreat in a while or if you have never been on one, pray about it. A retreat is something that can really refresh you spiritually and physically.

Now to the second thing I wanted to address this week, the confusion and chaos in the Church. I will try to be short and to the point here. There is a lot of confusion and questions because of what has been coming out of Rome lately, with the synod and various responses to questions about blessing homosexual "marriages", transgender people being godparents and all sorts of things. Endless dialogues and committees that keep calling into question settled Tradition and teaching. The seeming support of those who wish not to follow Christ's Church but remake the Church of God into the church of man, to model it not on Christ, but on society. There is great confusion.

Let us look at a few of the things Pope Francis has actually said: "I have spoken clearly about this, no?"

he said, adding: "Marriage is a sacrament. The church doesn't have the power to change sacraments. It's as our Lord established." And "It (homosexual activity) is a sin, as is any sexual act outside of marriage. This is to speak of 'the matter' of sin, but we know well that Catholic morality not only takes into consideration the matter, but also evaluates freedom and intention; and this, for every kind of sin". And "Gender ideology, today, is one of the most dangerous ideological colonizations. Why is it dangerous? Because it blurs differences and the value of men and women". And also "Today children — children — are taught in school that everyone can choose his or her sex. Why are they teaching this? Because the books are provided by the people and institutions that give you money. These forms of ideological colonization are also supported by influential countries. And this is terrible!"

It seems like there is a conflict going on between the things the Holy Father has said and other things coming out of Rome, there is a lot of ambiguity. These replies we have been seeing to the dubia questions are what I would call - no, but maybe, sometimes, kind of, sort of, probably not - replies. They are an exercise in tongue twisting theological phrases and ideas without clearly saying "do not do this" but "maybe you can" but "then again you can't if" - and here we have the confusion as they seem to say: you can't, but maybe you can. If you read through the latest set for example, which the media came out saying that "the church says transgender people can be baptized". This is an excerpt of the rest of that reply: The DDF said that: "a transexual person - who has undergone hormone treatment and sex reassignment surgery - can receive baptism under the same conditions as other believers, if there are no situations in which there is a risk of generating public scandal, or disorientation among the faithful." "In any case, the Church should always call [someone] to live out fully all the implications of the received baptism, which must always be understood and unfolded within the entire journey of Christian initiation". The response also

cautioned that special considerations ought to be considered when it comes to transsexuals receiving baptism, "especially when there are doubts about the objective moral situation the person is in, or about his or her subjective dispositions toward grace." The response quoted Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC), clarifying that when a person is baptized without repenting of "grave sins," they do not receive the "sanctifying grace" of the sacrament, although they do receive the "sacramental character," meaning, theologically speaking, that the person is still baptized and therefore inclined to grace.

So, when taken into account with the teaching of the Church and the replies of Pope Francis himself, this means there is an expectation for them to not only live a life of chastity but also to not campaign or publicly support gender ideology (as Pope Francis has called it), to live a life in accord with the teachings of the faith. But the media neglected to mention that part, right?

In reality, the media is the last place to look for an honest explanation of what the pope says or the Church teaches.

I am not the judge of the pope. God is the just judge and will judge the pope and every cardinal, bishop, priest, nun and lay Catholic. He will also judge every other person on this earth, the media and those responsible for much of the confusion in our world, and all those who do harm.

I will continue to pray for the Holy Father as he is the leader of the Church and the successor of St. Peter. I will not jump off the barque of Peter and expect to find safe ground in the tempest raging in our world. We are called to pray for our Holy Father, for our church and for each other. I will continue to be grateful to God for our good and faithful Bishop Boyea. I will say only this, that come what may and whatever the cost, I will hold to the traditions and teachings of the Church. The teachings and faith that Christ handed on to His apostles; the faith the apostles preached and suffered for; the faith the martyrs died for; the faith that our ances-

tors sacrificed and lived for. The Church of Christ, the Bride of the Lamb will survive these battles and struggles as well. Regardless of what the media trumpets about the Church changing faith and morals, it has not done so and cannot, which is why there is such intentional ambiguity in so many of these things including in theology in general and in Rome these days.

We would all do well hold fast to the words of our Savior Himself: "Do not be afraid any longer, little flock, for your Father is pleased to give you the kingdom." And finally to heed His call "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age."
